<p>All children are encouraged to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Develop in interest in and fascination with the wonders of history and begin to understand that we can learn from history • Use and understand the relevant subject specific vocabulary • Gain an understanding of the diversity of society and culture in modern Britain and the lives of significant people and events that have shaped our nation and wider world. • Develop a knowledge of chronology so they can organise their understanding of the past and the 'bigger picture' • Ask questions and study a range of historical sources and begin to understand the methods of historical enquiry • Understand historical concepts such as continuity and change, cause and consequence, similarity, difference and significance <p>As part of our history provision at Bildeston Primary School we aim to</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • provide our pupils with a broad range of opportunities, including a range of educational visits and theme days • ensure that our pupils develop an understanding of the world and how 	<p>As part of this planning process, teachers need to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Identify relevant language and vocabulary and ensure that this is taught and used accurately by both staff and children. • Plan cycles of lessons for history, adapted from Curriculum Maestro which carefully plan for progression and depth • Make links to the school's values and British values • Identify areas of weakness and seek support from the History lead or develop their own subject knowledge • Organise (as appropriate) visits, theme days or artefacts to investigate to enhance the learning experience • Challenge children by questioning and as children grow help them to understand methods of history enquiry • Develop children's understanding of historical concepts such as continuity and change, cause and consequence, similarity, difference and significance <p>As part of this assessment process, teachers will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Make observations during lessons and give feedback to aid progress 	<p>Impact is measured by ensuring that children not only acquire the age-related knowledge linked to the History curriculum, but also skills which equip them to progress from their starting points, and within their everyday lives.</p> <p>All children will have:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • A wider variety of skills linked to chronological awareness, knowledge and understanding, historical concepts and organise, evaluate and communicate information • A richer vocabulary which will enable them to articulate their understanding of taught concepts • High aspirations, which will see them through to further study, work and a successful adult life. • A love for history, which will encourage their interest in the wider world and provide a solid foundation for learning history in the next phase of their education <p>In addition, we measure the impact of our curriculum through the following methods:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Monitoring of pupil progress • Book scrutinies • Pupil interviews
